RUSSELL COUNTY JUNK YARD ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING JUNK DEALERS, THE ESTABLISHMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF JUNKYARDS, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO AUTOMOBILE JUNKYARDS, THE STORAGE AND DISPOSAL OF SCRAP, REFUSE, AND JUNK ARTICLES, PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF LICENESES FOR JUNK DEALERS AND FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF JUNKYARDS UNDER PRESCRIBED CONDITION, PRESCRIBING REMEDIES FOR THE ABATEMENT OF NUISANCES AND UNLICENSED JUNK YARDS AND SCRAP YARDS, PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATORS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE REVOCATION OF LICENSES IN THE EVENT OF NON-COMPLIANCE.

<u>Section 1:</u> <u>Short-Title</u>. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as "Russell County Junkyard and Refuse Ordinance".

<u>Section 2</u>: <u>Definitions</u>. "Unless otherwise expressly stated, the following words and phrases shall be construed throughout this ordinance to have the meanings herein indicated:

- a. <u>Person</u>. Shall include any partnership, association, firm, corporation, or individual.
- b. Board. Shall mean the Board of Supervisors of Russell County.
- c. <u>Junk</u>. Shall mean old or scrap copper, brass, rope, rags, batteries, paper, trash, rubber, debris, waste or junked, dismantled, or wrecked automobiles or parts thereof, iron, steel, and other old or scrap ferrous or non-ferrous material.
- d. <u>Junk Yard</u>. Shall mean an establishment or place of business which is maintained, operated or used for storing, keeping, buying, or selling junk or operation of an automobile graveyard, and the term shall include garbage dumps and sanitary fills.
- e. <u>Automobile graveyards</u>. Shall mean any lot or place which is exposed to the weather and upon which more than five motor vehicles of any kind, incapable of being operated, and which it would not be economically practical to make operative, are place, located or found.
- f. <u>Junk Dealer</u>. Shall mean any person, as hereinafter defined (1) who shall engage in the business of buying, selling, storing, salvaging, processing, disposing of, or accumulating junk, and (2) who maintains and operates a junkyard within the County of Russell.
- g. License. Shall mean the permit granted to a junk dealer.

<u>Section 3</u>. <u>License</u>. No person shall engage in business as a junk dealer, or maintain a junk yard, or automobile grave yard, without first having obtained a license from the Board, for which license a fee in

accordance with the schedule hereinafter set forth shall be paid to Russell County. The license shall be issued for the twelve month period beginning July 1 and ending June 30 of the following year, and each license must be renewed annually or before the first day of July of each year.

Such license shall state the name of the person to who such license is issued and the premises on which such junkyard is to be maintained. Such license shall be posted conspicuously upon the premises licensed thereunder.

Section 4. Application for License.

Application for the license described above shall be made by the person desiring to be licensed. Said application shall be in writing and shall include the following information:

- (1) name, address and telephone of applicant;
- (2) specific location and description of proposed junkyard site;
- (3) a map of site showing boundaries and dimensions, natural drainage and any proposed changes in that drainage, and adjacent landowners.

<u>Section 5.</u> <u>Issuance of Licenses.</u> The Planning Commission shall make a thorough initial examination of the application, taking into consideration the suitability of the property proposed to be used for the purposes of the license, the character of the property located nearby, and the effect of the proposed use, both economic and aesthetic. The Planning Commission shall make a report of its findings to the Board of Supervisors. The Board of Supervisors may issue a license subject to such additional terms and conditions, in addition to the regulations contained herein and adopted pursuant to this ordinance, as may be deemed necessary by the Board to carry out the spirit and intent of this ordinance.

<u>Section 6</u>: <u>Review</u>. In cases where the Board of Supervisors (hereafter "Board") shall issue a denial of a license the Applicant shall have a right of review of the decision as set forth hereafter.

Section 6 (a). Informal Fact Finding. The Applicant may within ten (10) days file a written request of informal fact finding with the County Administrator. The County Administrator shall notify the Board of the request for informal fact finding. The Board or its appointed agent shall schedule a hearing date within twenty (20) days of the request for informal fact finding. Such informal fact finding conference - consultation shall include the right of parties to the case (i) to have reasonable notice thereof, (ii) to appear in person or by counsel or other qualified representative before the Board or its' subordinates for the informal presentation of factual data, argument, or proof in connection with any case, (iii) to have notice of any contrary fact basis or information in the possession of the Planning Commission upon

which the Board may rely in any way in making an adverse decision, (iv) to receive a decision within ten (10) days of the date of hearing of any application for a license or renewal thereof and(v) to be informed, briefly and generally in writing of the factual or procedural basis for an adverse decision in any case.

Section 6 (b). Formal Proceedings.

A. In the event the Applicant receives an adverse decision based upon the informal fact finding, he may, within ten (10) days of the date of said adverse decision file a request for formal proceeding with the County Administrator. The County Administrator shall immediately notify the Board of the request for said formal proceeding. The formal proceeding shall be held within twenty (20) days of the date of the receipt of the request for said formal proceeding

- B. The Board shall afford an opportunity for the formal taking of evidence upon relevant fact issues in any case in which an adverse decision has been made.
- C. Parties to such formal proceedings shall be given reasonable notice of (i) the time, place, and nature thereof, (ii) the basic law or laws under which the Board contemplates its' possible exercise of authority, and (iii) the matters of fact and law asserted or questioned by the Planning Commission.
- D. In all such formal proceedings the parties shall be entitled to be accompanied by and represented by counsel, to submit oral and documentary evidence and rebuttal proofs, to conduct such cross-examination as may illicit a full and fair disclosure of the facts, and to have the proceedings completed and a decision made within ten (10) days of the date of hearing. The burden of proof shall be upon the Proponent or Applicant. The Board, or its subordinates designated for the purpose, shall preside at the taking of evidence. The presiding officer at such proceedings are empowered to (i) administer oaths and affirmations, (ii) receive probative evidence, exclude relevant, immaterial, insubstantial, privileged, or repetitive proofs, rebuttal, or cross-examination, rule upon offers of proof and oversee an accurate verbatim recording of the evidence, (iii) hold conferences for the settlement or simplification of issues by consent, (iv) dispose of procedural requests, and (v) regulate and expedite the course of hearing. Where subordinates preside, they shall recommend findings in a decision, unless the Board shall, by its procedural regulations, provide for the making of findings and an initial decision by such presiding officers subject to review and reconsideration of the Board on appeal to it as of right or on its own motion.
- E. Prior to the recommendations or decision of subordinates, the parties concerned shall be given opportunity, on request, to submit in writing, for the record, (i) proposed findings and conclusions and (ii) statement of reasons therefore. In all cases, on request, opportunities shall be afforded for oral argument, (i) to subordinate presiding officers in all case in which they make such recommendations or decisions or (ii) through the Board in cases in which it makes the original decision without such prior recommendation and otherwise as it may permit in its discretion or provide by general rule.

Where subordinates make recommendations or decisions, the Board shall receive and act on exceptions thereto.

F. All decisions or recommended decisions shall be served upon the parties, become a part of the record, and briefly state or recommend the findings, conclusions, reasons or basis therefore upon the evidence presented by the record and relevant to the basic law under which the Planning Commission is operating together with an appropriate order granting the license or denial thereof.

<u>Section 6(c)</u>. <u>Written Notices</u>. All notices of review and all orders of the Board shall be served upon the designated party by certified mail, unless service otherwise made is duly acknowledged by the party receiving same in writing.

<u>Section 6 (d)</u>. <u>Court Review</u>. Any person effected by or any party aggrieved by a decision of the Board shall have a right to the direct court review thereof by an appropriate and timely court action against the Board in the manner provided by the Rules of the Supreme Court of Virginia. Provided, however, that no such right of review shall be brought, unless within twenty-one (21) days of the date of the decision appealed from, there is instituted an action for the review of same in the appropriate court.

<u>Section 7</u>. <u>License Fee</u>. The license fee shall be paid immediately upon the issuance or renewal of a license to the Russell County Board of Supervisors. The amount of the license fee shall be <u>ONE</u> HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLARS. No tract of land larger than twenty (20) acres, excluding setback areas, shall be used as a junkyard.

<u>Section 8</u>. <u>License Limitation</u>. No person licensed under this ordinance shall, by virtue of one license, maintain more than one junkyard. No person shall engage in business as a junk dealer in any place other than the place designated upon his license, or maintain a junkyard in any place other than the place designated upon his license.

<u>Section 9</u>. <u>Transfer of License</u>. No license issued by the Board shall be transferable by the licensee to any other person unless such a transfer is authorized by the Board. Any person desiring to transfer his license shall notify the Board in writing, which notification shall be accompanied by an application for license, as described in Section 4 of this ordinance, by the transferee.

<u>Section 10</u>. <u>Transfer Fee</u>. In the event the Board shall approve the transfer of a license, the transferee shall immediately pay to the Russell County Board of Supervisors a transfer fee of one (\$100) dollars. Licenses <u>do not</u> run with the land.

<u>Section 11.</u> <u>Inspection.</u> Upon presentation of proper identification to the owner or custodian of a junkyard as defined herein the Board of Supervisors or their duly authorized representative, the County Sanitation Officer, may periodically inspect any licensed junkyard; any junkyard for which there has been made an application for a license; or any junkyard as defined herein for which no application for license has been made. The purpose of said inspection is to determine initial and continual compliance with the Regulations of this Ordinance.

<u>Section 12</u>. Regulations. Every person licensed under this ordinance shall constantly maintain the licensed premises in accordance with any special provisions imposed by the Board and in the manner prescribed by this section and any subsequent regulations adopted by the Board;

- a. Such premises shall at all times be maintained so as not to constitute a nuisance or a menace to the health of the community or of residents nearby or a place for the breeding of rodents and vermin.
- b. No garbage or other organic waste shall be stored in such premises.
- c. Whenever any motor vehicle shall be received in such premises as junk, all gasoline shall be drained and removed therefrom. Gasoline in an amount not exceeding five hundred (500) gallons may be stored above ground in said junk yards provided the same be placed in containers approved by the Board. All other gasoline which is kept in the premises shall be stored underground, which underground storage must be approved by the Board.
- d. The manner of storage and arrangement of junk, and the drainage facilities of the premises shall be such as to prevent the accumulation of stagnant water upon the premises, and to facilitate access for fire-fighting purposes.
- e. It shall be unlawful for any person licensed under this ordinance to burn junk within a junkyard at any time except in the manner approved by the Virginia Air Pollution Control Board. However, no oil, grease, tires, gasoline or other similar material that might be dangerous or tend to produce obnoxious smoke or odors shall be burned within a junkyard at any time.
- f. The premises to be licensed shall be set back a minimum distance of fifty (50) feet from the right -of-way lines on all streets or roads and a minimum distance of fifty (50) from all other property lines. The area between the setback line and

- the right-of-way line and all streets and roads and all other property lines, shall be at all times, kept clear and vacant.
- g. No junkyard shall be hereafter established, any portion of which is within one thousand feet of the nearest edge of the right-of-way of any primary highway or within five hundred feet of the nearest edge of the right-of-way of any other highway or city street, except the following:
 - (1) Junkyards which are screened by natural objects, plantings, fences, or other appropriate means so as not to be visible from the main-traveled way of the highway or city street or otherwise removed from sight.
 - (2) Junkyards which are located in areas which are zoned for industrial use under authority of State law or in unzoned industrial areas as determined by the rules and regulations of the State Highway Commission.
 - (3) Junkyards which are not visible from the main-traveled way of the highway or city street.
- h. Each license holder must keep an accurate log book in which each purchase or sale of junk is recorded, and such book shall be subject to inspection, all as provided in Virginia Code §54-832 (1980 supp.).

Section 13. Violations. Any person who shall fail to obtain a license as required above shall be subject to a penalty of fifty (\$50) dollars. For any other violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, penalty shall be fixed upon conviction, in an amount not to exceed one hundred (\$100) dollars and the costs of prosecution. Each day's violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense. Violators will be prosecuted in the General District Court of Russell County.

Section 14. Conformity. Any junkyard, as defined herein, in existence on July 1, 1981, which is unlicensed, shall have ninety (90) days from a final determination made by the Board pursuant to paragraph 6 above that it is subject to being licensed, to conform to this ordinance. Any junkyard, as defined herein, which came into existence after July 1, 1981, and which cannot be made to conform to this ordinance, it declared to be a private and public nuisance and may be forthwith removed, obliterated or abated by the Board of Supervisors or it's representatives. The Board of Supervisors may collect the cost of such removal, obliteration or abatement from the person owning or operating such junkyard and the costs of same shall be a lien against the property until the same is satisfied in full.

<u>Section 15</u>. <u>Abatement of Nuisances</u>. In addition to the remedies provided in Section 12 above, any continued violations of this ordinance which shall constitute a nuisance in fact or which shall in the opinion of the Board constitute a nuisance may be abated by proceeding against the violator in a court of equity for relief.

<u>Section 16</u>. <u>Severability</u>. If any section of this ordinance shall be found to be invalid the other sections of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

<u>Section 17</u>. <u>Repeal</u>. All ordinances or parts of ordinance in conflict herewith be and same are hereby repealed.

Section 18. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective July 1, 1989.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT

This ordinance is enacted pursuant to authority contained in §§ 15.2-930, 15.2-1426, 15.2-1427, 15.2-1200, 33.1-346 and Chapter 14, Title 10.1 of the Code of Virginia, 1950 as amended.

Purpose

It is the purpose of this article to accomplish refuse management throughout the County in order to control disease; to prevent blight and other environmental degradation; to promote the generation of energy and recovery of useful resources from solid waste; to protect limited natural resources for the benefit of its citizens; to limit noxious odors and unsightly garbage, trash, refuse or decay; and to promote and protect the public health, safety and welfare.

General

- (a) *Citations.* This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Russell County Solid Waste Management Ordinance."
- (b) Severability. Should any section or provision of this article be declared by the courts to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the article as a whole, or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.
- (c) Effective Date. This ordinance shall be in full force an effect from the date of adoption.

Definitions

For purpose of this ordinance, the following terms shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them herein:

Agricultural Waste means all solid waste produced from farming operations.

Authority means the Cumberland Plateau Regional Waste Management Authority created by the Buchanan County Board of Supervisors, Dickenson County Board of Supervisors, and Russell County Board of Supervisors for the purpose of collection of garbage and refuse within the member jurisdictions.

Board of supervisors, mean the Russell County Board of Supervisors.

Bulk Waste means appliances, furniture, bedding material, automobile parts, mechanical equipment, mechanical parts, and carpet.

Clean Wood means solid waste consisting of untreated wood pieces and particles that do not contain paint, laminate, bonding agents, or chemical preservatives or are otherwise unadulterated.

Commercial waste means all solid waste generated by establishments engaged in business operations other than manufacturing or construction. This category includes, but is not limited to, solid waste resulting from the operations of stores, markets, office buildings, restaurants, and shopping centers.

Construction Waste means solid waste which is produced or generated during the construction, remodeling, or repair of pavements, houses, commercial buildings, and other structures. Construction waste include, but are not limited to, lumber, wire, sheet rock, brick, shingles, glass, pipes, concrete, paving materials, and metal and plastics if the metal or plastics are a part of the materials of construction or empty containers for such materials. Paints, coatings, solvents, asbestos, any liquid, compressed gasses or semi-liquids and garbage are not construction wastes.

Commercial Collectors Any properly permitted commercial garbage and waste collection hauler, contractor or business located within and doing business with Russell County.

Convenience Center means a collection point for the temporary storage of solid waste provided premises to an established centralized point, rather than directly to a disposal facility. To be classified as a convenience center, the collection point may not receive waste from collection vehicles that have regularly scheduled collections.

County means Russell County, Virginia.

Debris Waste means wastes resulting from land clearing operations. Debris waste include, but are not limited to, stumps, wood, brush, leaves, soil, and road spoils.

Demolition waste means that solid waste which is produced by destruction of structures and their foundations and includes the same materials as construction waste.

Facility means Russell County convenience sites and the Russell County transfer station.

Federal acts mean any act of Congress providing for waste management and any regulations promulgated thereunder.

Garbage means readily putrescible discarded materials composed of animal, vegetable or other organic matter.

General public means persons or businesses within the county.

Hauler means and individual, company, corporation, public or private institution, or cooperative, county, city, or town or other political subdivision of this commonwealth or other state, interstate body, or other legal entity or combination

of the above, who hauls refuse, garbage, sludge or other solid waste as defined by this article to the County for disposal.

Hazardous material means a substance or material in a form or quantity which may pose an unreasonable risk to health, safety or property when transported, and which the Secretary of Transportation of the United States has so designated by regulation or order.

Hazardous substance means a substance listed under United States Public Law 96-510, entitled the Comprehensive Environmental Response Compensation and Lability Act.

Hazardous waste means a solid waste or combination of solid waste, which, because of its quantity, concentration or physical, chemical or infectious characteristics, may:

- (1) Cause or significantly contribute to an increase in mortality or an increase in serious irreversible or incapacitating illness; or,
- (2) Pose a substantial present or potential hazard to human health or the environment when improperly treated, stored, transported, disposed of, or otherwise managed.
 - These solid wastes include, but are not limited to, pesticides, poisons, corrosives, combustibles, caustics, acids, infectious materials, explosives, compressed gases, biological and chemical materials, radioactive materials, flammable materials, and petroleum products.

Household waste means those items of solid waste that can reasonably be expected to be generated from within a home by the day-to-day operation of the household. The term household waste specifically excludes construction waste, demolition waste and yard waste.

Industrial waste means any solid waste generated by manufacturing or industrial process that is not a regulated hazardous waste. This term does not include mining waste or oil and gas waste.

Litter means, for purposes of this chapter, any solid waste that is discarded or scattered about a solid waste management facility outside the immediate working area.

Loitering means the act of idly remaining in a public place for a protracted time.

Open dump means a site on which any solid waste or hazardous waste is place, discharged deposited, injected, dumped, or spilled so as to create a nuisance or so as to present a threat of a release of harmful substances into the environment or present a hazard to humans or the environment.

Municipal solid waste means that waste that is normally composed of residential, commercial, and institutional solid waste and residues derived from combustion of these wastes.

Person means an individual, corporation, partnership, association, a governmental body, a municipal corporation, or any other legal entity.

Recycling means the process of separating a given waste material from the waste stream and processing it so that it is used again as a raw material for a product which may or may not be similar to the original product.

Regulated medical waste means waste as defined by the Regulated Medical Waste Management Regulations (9VAC20-120) as promulgated by the Virginia Waste Management Board.

Salvage means the authorized, controlled removal of waste materials from a solid was management facility.

Sanitary landfill means an engineered land burial facility for the disposal of household waste that is so located, designed, constructed, and operated to contain and isolate the waste so that it does not pose a substantial present or potential hazard to human health or the environment. A sanitary landfill also may receive other type of solid wastes, such as commercial solid waste, nonhazardous sludge, and hazardous waste from conditionally exempt small quantity generators, construction demolition debris, and nonhazardous industrial solid waste.

Scrap Metal mean bits and pieces of metal parts, such as bars, rods, wire, empty containers or metal pieces that may be combined together with bolts or soldering which are discarded material and can be used, reused, or reclaimed.

Sludge means any solid, semi-solid, or liquid waste generated from a municipal, commercial, or industrial wastewater treatment plant, water supply treatment plant or air pollution control facility exclusive of treated effluent from a wastewater treatment plant.

Solid Waste means any garbage, refuse, sludge, or other discarded material, including solid, semisolid, liquid, or contained gaseous material resulting from industrial commercial, mining, and agricultural operations, or community activities but does not include:

- (1) Solid or dissolved material in domestic sewage.
- (2) Solid or dissolved material in irrigation return flows or in industrial discharges which are sources subject to a permit from the department of environmental quality.
- (3) Nuclear, or by product material as defined by the Federal Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended.

Solid Waste facilities means those facilities, including but not limited to, convenience centers, sanitary landfill, transfer site or transfer station, provided by the county for with solid waste may be deposited.

Solid waste management means the administration of activities which provide for the collection, separation, storage, transportation, transfer, processing, treatment, recycling, and disposal of solid waste.

Tipping fees means those fees charged for commercial and industrial generators of solid waste doing business within Russell County, Virginia pursuant to the Russell County Solid Waste Tipping Fee Ordinance.

Transfer Site means a site, other than a sanitary landfill, transfer site or convenience center, upon which specified types of solid waste may be deposited and to which such solid waste is deposited on a regular schedule for proper disposition.

Transfer station means a site, other than a sanitary landfill, transfer site or convenience center, upon which specified types of solid waste may be deposited and to which such solid waste is deposited on a regular schedule for proper disposition.

Transport or transportation means any movement of property and any packing, loading, unloading or storage incidental thereto.

Yard waste means that fraction of municipal solid waste that consists of grass clippings, leaves, brush and tree pruning's arising from general landscape maintenance.

GENERAL PROHIBITIONS

- A. *Authorized use.* Use of the county's sanitary solid waste facilities are limited to persons or businesses disposing of solid waste generated and originated from within the county.
- B. *Open dumps.* No person shall operate, construct, maintain or dispose of solid waste in open dumps.
- C. *Private landfills*. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a private landfill or to allow waste to be disposed on or otherwise manage on his property within the county unless permitted by the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality or such other agencies of the Commonwealth of Virginia as may be authorized by law, or regulation to permit such activity. Additionally, it shall be the duty of all persons to dispose of or otherwise manage their solid waste in a legal manner.
- D. *Hazardous waste*. It shall be unlawful for any person to dispose of hazardous waste within the county.

- E. Scavenging. Scavenging of any material from a county-owned sanitary landfill, transfer site or convenience center is prohibited.
- F. Regulated medical waste. It shall be unlawful for any person to dispose of regulated medical waste at a county-owned sanitary landfill, transfer site, transfer station or convenience center.

TRESPASSING

- (a) Sanitary landfill. It shall be unlawful for any person, other than county employees actually engaged in the course of their employment and law enforcement officers in the performance of their official duties, to enter or cause another to enter upon county sanitary landfill property except during normal business hours of operation.
 - (1) Restrictive access. During the hours of normal operation, county employees shall direct persons to specific areas of the landfill and/or shall prohibit access to specified areas of the sanitary landfill. It shall be unlawful for any person to disobey such directive.
- (b) Transfer sites and convenience centers. It shall be unlawful for any person, other than county employees actually engaged in the course of their employment, and law enforcement officers in the performance of their official duties, to enter or cause another to enter upon an area controlled and operated by the county as a transfer site or a convenience center, except during the hours of operation.
- (c) Parking. It shall be unlawful for any person, other than a county employee or law enforcement officer actually engaged in the course of his employment, to stop or park a motor vehicle on a county sanitary landfill, transfer site or convenience center except temporarily for the purpose of unloading solid waste in accordance with the provisions of this article and the regulations promulgated thereunder.

LITTERING

(a) *General.* It shall be unlawful for any person to dispose of or cause to be disposed of any solid waste by littering in or upon any property within Russell County.

Any person who disposes of solid waste by placing same inside a container provided by the county for the purpose of collecting said solid waste shall be deemed to be in compliance with the requirements of this section.

- (b) *Transfer sites.* It shall be unlawful for any person to drop, deposit, discard or otherwise dispose of solid waste in, on or around any transfer site except in refuse containers provided for the purpose of solid waste collection.
- (c) Convenience centers. It shall be unlawful for any person to drop, deposit, discard or otherwise dispose of solid waste in, on or around any convenience center except in refuse containers provided for the purpose of solid waste collection unless county

- established procedures provided for the purpose of solid waste collection unless county established procedures provide otherwise for specified types of solid waste.
- (d) *Transportation of solid waste.* It shall be unlawful for any person to collect or transport solid waste in a vehicle unless such solid waste shall be enclosed or securely covered by a canvas, screen wire, or secured by other means to prevent its loss from the vehicle in transit.

DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS

It shall be unlawful for any person willfully to discharge, or cause to be discharged, a firearm into or upon the property of sanitary landfill facilities, transfer sites or convenience centers; provided that this section shall not apply to any law enforcement officer in the performance of his official duties nor to any other person whose said willful act is otherwise justifiable or excusable at law in the protection of his life or property.

COUNTY SANITARY LANDFILL FACILITIES

- (a) Sanitary landfill. Sanitary landfill facilities shall be owned and operated by the county and are not for the use of the general public. Such facilities shall be operated under permit from the department of environmental quality and in accordance with rules and regulations promulgated by said department. The sanitary landfill facilities are no longer operational for the acceptance of new solid waste of any kind.
- (b) *Hours of operation*. Sanitary landfill facilities shall be closed to the general public.
- (c) Landfill attendants. Sanitary landfill activities necessary for closing and monitoring the sanitary landfills shall be supervised and controlled by county employees at all times. It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully disobey, ignore, or improperly carry out any legal and proper order or direction of any such employee directed toward the proper use of the sanitary landfill facilities.
- (d) *Unacceptable wastes*. All solid wastes of every, kind, nature and description are unacceptable at county sanitary landfill facilities.

TRANSFER SITES

- (a) Establishment. The Cumberland Plateau Regional Waste Management Authority, of which the county is a member, may authorize establishment of transfer sites at locations deemed necessary to adequately serve the citizens of the county. Sites shall be selected with due regard for convenience of residents in the service area, safe ingress and egress, traffic flow, topography, environmental protection, avoidance of nuisances to adjacent and nearby residents and landowners, and budgetary concerns.
- (b) *Hours of operation.* Transfer sites shall be open to the general public on a regular schedule. The Authority is authorized to set the days and hours of operation.

- (c) *Unauthorized items.* The following items may not be placed in the containers or on the ground at transfer sites:
 - (1) Hazardous waste including asbestos material and regulated medical waste.
- (2) Animal carcasses, including fowl, other than pets (i.e., cats and dogs) and road kill animals.
 - (3) Liquid. Liquid is the solid waste that qualifies as liquid under the Environmental Protection Agency Paint Filter Test. Any solid waste containing less than 25 percent solids, by weight, is also considered a liquid.
 - (4) Vehicles. Automobiles, trucks, buses, trailers, farm equipment, construction vehicles such as bulldozers, cranes and other like motorized vehicles and equipment.
 - (5) Closed drums.
 - (6) Slaughterhouse waste.
 - (7) Unapproved industrial process waste.
 - (8) Unapproved sewage sludge.
 - (9) Improperly prepared containers such as paint cans and pesticide containers.

Said items must be disposed of in an authorized landfill or other authorized collection site.

- (e) Containment. With the exception of bulky items and items that do not lend themselves to packaging, all refuse containers at transfer sites shall be contained in securely closed plastic bags, heavy paper bags or other containers which will prevent or minimize scattering or blowing of refuse.
- (f) Boxes. Cardboard boxes, crates, and similar containers shall be cut and flattened prior to placement in refuse containers at transfer sites.
- (g) Littering. It shall be unlawful for any person to drop, deposit discard, or otherwise dispose of any solid waste or other material in, on, or around any transfer site except in refuse containers provided for the purpose of solid waste collection. (Also see section §17.2-109(f)). Any article found so placed outside of a refuse container and name and/or address appears thereon, and that such person placed or caused to be placed such article outside of a refuse container; provided, however, that such presumption shall be rebuttable by competent evidence. A canvas, screen wire or other such material shall securely cover all vehicles used for collection/transportation of solid waste to prevent littering.
- (h) *Parking*. No parking of motor vehicles, except official county vehicles, shall be permitted at any time on any transfer site. Only temporary stopping for the purpose of unloading solid waste into refuse containers shall be permitted.

- (i) Borrow pits and privately licensed solid waste facilities. The provision of this article shall not apply to those person or entities licensed and /or permitted by the department of environmental quality, Virginia Department of Health, county department of health, department of mines, minerals, and energy in the maintenance and operation of borrow pits, and the disposal of such items as are approved by those agencies in the use and reclamation of mines and borrow pits.
- (j) Recycling. The county shall provide containers, at designated locations, to facilitate recycling. Containers shall be provided to facilitate collection of selected recycling commodities. Containers shall be clearly marked to indicate the recycling commodity or commodities that may be placed in the containers. It shall be illegal for any person to place anything in these containers other that the recycling commodity or commodities so designated.
- (k) *Tipping Fees.* Every commercial and industrial generator of solid waste doing business within Russell County, Virginia shall be charged a disposal tipping fee for solid waste collection and disposal for all solid waste directly or indirectly deposited at the transfer site in accordance with the Russell County Solid Waste Tipping Fee Ordinance.

CONVENIENCE CENTERS

- (a) Establishment. The Board of Supervisors may authorize establishment of convenience centers at locations deemed necessary to adequately serve the citizens of the county. Sites shall be selected with due regard for convenience of residents in the service are, safe ingress and egress, traffic flow, topography, environmental protection, avoidance of nuisances to adjacent and nearby residents and landowners and budgetary concerns.
- (b) Hours of operation. Convenience centers shall be open to the general public on a regular schedule. The county administrator is authorized to set the days and hours of operation.
- (c) *Users*. Convenience centers shall be available to persons disposing of limited quantities of household waste and designated recyclables originated and generated within the county. Convenience centers are not for commercial, business, or industrial use. Trailers and high-sided pickup trucks hauling large volumes of waste are prohibited.
- (d) *Unauthorized items*. The following items may not be brought to convenience centers:
- (1) Construction materials or debris such as timbers, brick, metal, shingles, and concrete.
 - (2) Appliances, bicycles, lawn mowers, other metal objects.
 - (3) Furniture or other bulk waste.

- (4) Dead animal and fowl.
- (5) Trees, bush, stumps, dirt, and other debris from land clearing, road building, and similar activities.
- (6) Tires.
- (7) Automobiles, trucks, construction equipment, and similar vehicles.
- (8) Sewage sludge.
- (9) Ashes, coals, and embers from solid fuel fired devices.
- (10) Hazardous materials such as pesticides.
- (11) Liquid wastes.
- (12) Pressurized containers such as propane tanks.
- (13) Improperly prepared containers.
- (e) Containment. With the exception of bulky items and items that do not lend themselves to packaging, all refuse brought to convenience centers shall be contained in the securely closed plastic bags, heavy paper bags, or other containers which will prevent or minimize scattering or blowing of refuse.
- (f) Littering. It shall be unlawful for any person to drop, deposit, discard, or otherwise dispose of any solid waste or other material in, on, or around any convenience center except in refuse containers provided for the purpose of solid waste collection (Also see section §17.2-108(g)). Any article found so placed at any convenience center and bearing a person's name and/or address shall be presumed to be the property of such person whose name and/or address appears thereon, and that such person placed or caused to be placed such article outside of a refuse container; provided, however, that such presumption shall be rebuttable by competent evidence. A canvas, screen wire or other such material shall securely cover all vehicles used for the collection/transportation of solid waste to prevent littering.
- (g) *Parking*. No parking of motor vehicles, except official county vehicles and the attendant's vehicle, shall be permitted at any time at any convenience center. Only temporary stopping for the purpose of authorized unloading of solid waste shall be permitted.
- (h) Recycling. The county may provide containers, at designated convenience centers, to facilitate recycling. Containers, when provided, are to facilitate collection of selected recycling commodities (such as plastics, glass, newspaper, used motor oil). Containers shall be clearly marked to indicate the recycling commodity or commodities that may be placed in the containers. It shall be illegal for any person to place anything in the containers. It shall be illegal for any person to place anything in these containers other than the recycling commodity or commodities so designated.

- (i) Scavenging.
 - (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to scavenge in or around the containers or otherwise remove any discarded solid waste from or about any solid waste site or any bulk or roll-off container.
 - (2) No person shall be permitted to remove trash, garbage, or any other items from within or around the containers or compactors located at the refuse sites.

VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES

- (a) Penalties for violation of any provision of this article or any County policy or regulation includes fines and possible revocation of the commercial collection permit. Violation of any provision of this article is a violation of Russell County Code and shall be deemed to be a Class 1 Misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$2500, or no more than 12 months in jail, or both or possible revocation of the commercial collection permit.
- (b) Nothing contained in this article shall limit the authority of any law enforcement officer having jurisdiction to issue appropriate criminal or other lawful process for violations committed in his presence or upon proper warrant.

COLLECTION PERMITS

- A. Every commercial collector or hauler disposing of solid waste in Russell County, Virginia shall obtain from the Russell County Board of Supervisors a permit before engaging in the collection and disposing of trash, or garbage or sludge.
- B. Every commercial collector or hauler shall make application for such permit on a form supplied by the Russell County Board of Supervisors, which application shall state the full name, address and telephone number of the applicant, together with the full name and address of the applicant's registered agent if the applicant is a corporation; the area within the County the applicant proposes to serve; or haul to, or from and dispose of solid waste and the number and size of the vehicles the applicant proposes to use.
- C. It shall be unlawfully too knowingly and intentional make a false statement in Appling for or securing a permit.
- D. Every applicant shall pay an annual fee as established by resolution of the Board of Supervisors for a permit, which shall expire January 15 of the year next following the year for which issued. It shall be unlawful to engage in trash, garbage collection and/or hauling of trash, garbage and sludge for disposal in the County without a current, valid permit.

DISPOSAL OF SOLID WASTE COLLECTED

A. It shall be unlawful to dump, store, burn, bury, destroy or otherwise dispose of garbage, trash, refuse or any other solid waste generated within the limits of the

- County except at the Russell County Transfer Station or a facilities of the County designated for solid waste disposal.
- B. It shall be unlawful to establish, maintain or operate an unregulated, unlicensed dump or landfill within Russell County, Virginia.

EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE

This ordinance shall be effective on the 13th day of March 2017. The county Administrator is directed to file a certified copy of this Ordinance in the Offices of the Clerk of the General District Court of Russell County and the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Russell County.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT¹

Sec. 17.2-100. Authorization

This ordinance is enacted pursuant to authority contained in §§ 15.2-930, 15.2-1426, 15.2-1427, 15.2-1200, 33.1-346 and Chapter 14, Title 10.1 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended.

Sec. 17.2-101. General.

- Citations. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Russell (a) County Solid Waste Management Ordinance."
- (b) Severability. Should any section or provision of this article be declared by the courts to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the article as a whole, or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.
- Effective Date. This ordinance shall be in full force an effect from the date of (c) adoption.

Sec. 17.2-102. Definitions.

For purpose of this ordinance, the following words and phrases shall have the meaning respectively ascribed to them by this section.

Authority means the Cumberland Plateau Regional Waste Management Authority created by the Buchanan County Board of Supervisors, Dickenson County Board of Supervisors and Russell County Board of Supervisors for the purpose of collection of garbage and refuse within the member jurisdictions.

Board of supervisors means the Russell County Board of Supervisors.

Bulk waste means appliances, furniture, bedding material, automobile parts, mechanical equipment, mechanical parts, and carpet.

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to, solid waste resulting from the operations of stores, markets, office buildings, restaurants and shopping centers.

Construction waste means solid waste which is produced or generated during the construction, remodeling, or repair of pavements, houses, commercial building, and other structures. Construction waste include, but are not limited to, lumber, wire, sheet rock, brick, shingles, glass, pipes, concrete, paving materials, and metal and plastics if the metal or plastics are a part of the materials of construction or empty containers for such materials. Debris waste means wastes resulting from land clearing operations. Debris wastes include, but are not limited to, stumps, wood, brush, leaves, soil, and road spoils.

Demolition waste means that solid waste which is produced by the destruction of structures and their foundations and includes the same materials as construction waste.

Federal acts means any act of Congress providing for waste management and any regulations promulgated thereunder.

Hazardous material means a substance or material in a form or quantity which may pose an unreasonable risk to health, safety or property when transported, and which the Secretary of Transportation of the United States has so designated by regulation or order.

Hazardous substance means a substance listed under United States Public Law 96-510, entitled the Comprehensive Environmental Response Compensation and Liability Act.

Hazardous waste means a solid waste or combination of solid waste, which, because of its quantity, concentration or physical, chemical or infectious characteristics, may:

- (1) Cause or significantly contribute to an increase in mortality or an increase in serious irreversible or incapacitating illness; or,
- (2) Pose a substantial present or potential hazard to human health or the environment when improperly treated, stored, transported, disposed of, or otherwise managed.

These solid wastes include, but are not limited to, pesticides, poisons, corrosives, combustibles, caustics, acids, infectious materials, explosives, compressed gases,

biological and chemical materials, radioactive materials, flammable materials, and petroleum products.

Household waste means those items of solid waste that can reasonable be expected to be generated from within a home by the day-to-day operation of the household. The term household waste specifically excludes construction waste, demolition waste and yard waste.

Industrial waste means any solid waste generated by a manufacturing or industrial process that is not a regulated hazardous waste.

Loitering means the act of idly remaining in a public place for a protracted time.

Open dump means a site on which any solid waste or hazardous waste is place, discharged deposited, injected, dumped, or spilled so as to create a nuisance or so as to present a threat of a release of harmful substances into the environment or present a hazard to humans or the environment.

Person means an individual, corporation, partnership, association, government body, municipal corporation, or any other legal entity.

Recycling means the process of separating a given waste material from the waste stream and processing it so that it is used again as a raw material for a product which may or may not be similar to the original product.

Regulated medical waste means waste as defined in 9-VAC-120-140. Such wastes include, but are not limited to, medical wastes such as sharps, cultures and stock of microorganisms and biologicals, blood and blood products, tissues and other anatomical wastes.

Salvage means the authorized, controlled removal of waste materials from a solid waste management facility.

Sanitary landfill means an engineered land burial facility for the disposal of solid waste so located, designed, constructed and operated to contain and isolate the waste so that it does not pose a substantial present or potential hazard to human health or the environment.

Scavenging means the unauthorized or uncontrolled removal of waste materials from a solid waste management facility.

Sludge means any solid, semi-solid, or liquid waste generated from a municipal, commercial, or industrial wastewater treatment plant, water supply treatment plant or air pollution control facility.

Solid Waste means any garbage, refuse, sludge, or other discarded material, including solid, semisolid, liquid, or contained gaseous material resulting from industrial, commercial, mining, and agricultural operations, or community activities but does not include:

(1) Solid or dissolved material in domestic sewage.

- (2) Solid or dissolved material in irrigation return flows or in industrial discharges which are sources subject to a permit from the department of environmental quality.
- (3) Nuclear, or by product material as defined by the Federal Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended.

- (b) Transfer sites and convenience centers. It shall be unlawful for any person, other than county employees actually engaged in the course of their employment, and law enforcement officers in the performance of their official duties, to enter or cause another to enter upon an area controlled and operated by the county as a transfer site or a convenience center, except during the hours of operation.
- (c) *Parking*. It shall be unlawful for any person, other than a county employee or law enforcement officer actually engaged in the course of his employment, to stop or park a motor vehicle on a county sanitary landfill, transfer site or convenience center except temporarily for the purpose of unloading solid waste in accordance with the provisions of this article and the regulations promulgated thereunder.

Sec. 17.2-105. Littering.

(a) *General*. It shall be unlawful for any person to dispose of or cause to be disposed of any solid waste by littering in or upon any property within Russell County. (Also see Russell County Litter Ordinance §§ 17.2-200 et seq.)

Any person who disposes of solid waste by placing same inside a container provided by the county for the purpose of collecting said solid waste shall be deemed to be in compliance with the requirements of this section.

- (b) *Transfer sites*. It shall be unlawful for any person to drop, deposit, discard or otherwise dispose of solid waste in, on or around any transfer site except in refuse containers provided for the purpose of solid waste collection.
- (c) Convenience centers. It shall be unlawful for an person to drop, deposit, discard or otherwise dispose of solid waste in, on or around any convenience center except in refuse containers provided for the purpose of solid waste collection unless county established procedures provide otherwise for specified types of solid waste.
- (d) *Transportation of solid waste*. It shall be unlawful for any person to collect or transport solid waste in a vehicle unless such solid waste shall be enclosed or securely covered by a canvas, screen wire, or secured by other means to prevent its loss from the vehicle in transit.

Sec. 17.2-106. Discharge of firearms.

It shall be unlawful for any person willfully to discharge, or cause to be discharged, a firearm into or upon the property of sanitary landfill facilities, transfer sites or convenience centers; provided that this section shall not apply to any law enforcement officer in the performance of his official duties nor to any other person whose said willful act is otherwise justifiable or excusable at law in the protection of his life or property.

Sec. 17,2-107. County sanitary landfill facilities.

- (a) Sanitary landfill. Sanitary landfill facilities shall be owned and operated by the county and are not for the use of the general public. Such facilities shall be operated under permit from the department of environmental quality and in accordance with rules and regulations promulgated by said department. The term "general public" as used in this section shall mean persons or businesses within the county. The sanitary landfill facilities are no longer operational for the acceptance of new solid waste of any kind nature or description into the sanitary landfill.
- (b) Hours of operation. Sanitary landfill facilities shall be closed to the general public.
- (c) Landfill attendants. Sanitary landfill activities necessary for closing and monitoring the sanitary landfills shall be supervised and controlled by county employees at all times. It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully disobey, ignore, or improperly carry out any legal and proper order or direction of any such employee directed toward the proper use of the sanitary landfill facilities.

(d) *Unacceptable wastes*. All solid wastes of every, kind, nature and description are unacceptable at county sanitary landfill facilities.

Sec. 17.2-108. Transfer sites.

- (a) *Establishment*. The Cumberland Plateau Regional Waste Management Authority, of which the county is a member, may authorize establishment of transfer sites at locations deemed necessary to adequately serve the citizens of the county. Sites shall be selected with due regard for convenience of residents in the service area, safe ingress and egress, traffic flow, topography, environmental protection, avoidance of nuisances to adjacent and nearby residents and landowners, and budgetary concerns.
- (b) *Hours of operation*. Transfer sites shall be open to the general public on a regular schedule. The Authority is authorized to set the days and hours of operation.
- (c) *Users*. Transfer sites shall be available for use by persons disposing of limited quantities of household waste originated and generated within the county.
- (d) *Unauthorized items*. The following items may not be placed in the containers or on the ground at transfer sites:
 - (1) Hazardous waste including asbestos material and regulated medical waste.
 - (2) Animal carcasses, including fowl, other than pets (i.e., cats and dogs) and road killed animals.
 - (3) Liquid. Liquid is the solid waste that qualifies as liquid under the Environmental Protection Agency Paint Filter Test. Any solid waste containing less that 25 percent solids, by weight, is also considered a liquid.
 - (4) Vehicles. Automobiles, trucks, buses, trailers, farm equipment, construction vehicles such as bulldozers, cranes and other like motorized vehicles and equipment.
 - (5) Closed drums.
 - (6) Slaughterhouse waste.
 - (7) Unapproved industrial process waste.
 - (8) Unapproved sewage sludge.
 - (9) Improperly prepared containers such as paint cans and pesticide containers.

Said items must be disposed of in an authorized landfill or other authorized collection site.

- (e) *Containment*. With the exception of bulky items and items that do not lend themselves to packaging, all refuse placed in refuse containers at transfer sites shall be contained in securely closed plastic bags, heavy paper bags, or other containers which will prevent or minimize scattering or blowing of refuse.
- (f) *Boxes*. Cardboard boxes, crates, and similar containers shall be cut and flattened prior to placement in refuse containers at transfer sites.
- (g) Littering. It shall be unlawful for any person to drop, deposit, discard, or otherwise dispose of any solid waste or other material in, on, or around any transfer site except in refuse containers provided for the purpose of solid waste collection. (Also see section §17.2-109(f)). Any article found so placed outside of a refuse container and bearing a person's name and/or address shall be presumed to be the property of such person whose name and/or address appears thereon, and that such person placed or caused to be placed such article outside of a refuse container; provided, however, that such presumption shall be rebuttable by competent evidence. A canvas, screen wire or other such material shall securely cover all vehicles used for collection/transportation of solid waste to prevent littering.
- (h) *Parking*. No parking of motor vehicles, except official county vehicles, shall be permitted at any time on any transfer site. Only temporary stopping for the purpose of unloading solid waste into refuse containers shall be permitted.
- (i) Borrow pits and privately licensed solid waste facilities. The provision of this article shall not apply to those persons or entities licensed and/or permitted by the department of environmental quality, Virginia Department of Health, county department of health, department of mines, minerals, and energy in the maintenance and operation of borrow pits, and the disposal of such items as are approved by those agencies in the use and reclamation of mines and borrow pits.
- (j) *Recycling*. The county shall provide containers, at designated locations, to facilitate recycling. Containers shall be provided to facilitate collection of selected recycling commodities. Containers shall be clearly marked to indicate the recycling commodity or commodities that may be placed in the containers. It shall be illegal for any person to place anything in these containers other than the recycling commodity or commodities so designated.

Tipping fees. Every commercial and industrial generator of solid waste doing business within Russell County, Virginia shall be charged a disposal tipping fee for solid waste collection and disposal for all solid waste directly or indirectly deposited at the transfer site in accordance with the Russell County Solid Waste Tipping Fee Ordinance.

Sec. 17.2-109. Convenience centers.

- (a) Establishment. The Board of Supervisors may authorize establishment of convenience centers at locations deemed necessary to adequately serve the citizens of the county. Sites shall be selected with due regard for convenience of residents in the service area, safe ingress and egress, traffic flow, topography, environmental protection, avoidance of nuisances to adjacent and nearby residents and landowners, and budgetary concerns.
- (b) Hours of operation. Convenience centers shall be open to the general public on a regular schedule. The county administrator is authorized to set the days and hours of operation.
- (c) *Users*. Convenience centers shall be available to persons disposing of limited quantities of household waste and designated recyclables originated and generated within the county. Convenience centers are not for commercial, business, or industrial use. Trailers and high-sided pickup trucks hauling large volumes of waste are prohibited.
- (d) Unauthorized items. The following items may not be brought to convenience centers:
 - (1) Construction materials or debris such as timbers, brick, metal, shingles, and concrete.
 - (2) Appliances, bicycles, lawn mowers, and other metal objects.
 - (3) Furniture or other bulk waste.
 - (4) Dead animal and fowl.
 - (5) Trees, bush, stumps, dirt, and other debris from land clearing, road building, and similar activities.
 - (6) Tires.
 - (7) Automobiles, trucks, construction equipment, and similar vehicles.
 - (8) Sewage sludge.
 - (9) Ashes, coals, and embers from solid fuel fired devices.
 - (10) Hazardous materials such as pesticides.
 - (11) Liquid wastes.
 - (12) Pressurized containers such as propane tanks.
 - (13) Improperly prepared containers

- (e) Containment. With the exception of bulky items and items that do not lend themselves to packaging, all refuse brought to convenience centers shall be contained in securely closed plastic bags, heavy paper bags, or other containers which will prevent or minimize scattering or blowing of refuse.
- (f) Littering. It shall be unlawful for any person to drop, deposit, discard, or otherwise dispose of any solid waste or other material in, on, or around any convenience center except in refuse containers provided for the purpose of solid waste collection (Also see section §17.2-108(g)). Any article found so placed at any convenience center and bearing a person's name and/or address shall be presumed to be the property of such person whose name and/or address appears thereon, and that such person placed or caused to be placed such article outside of a refuse container; provided, however, that such presumption shall be rebuttable by competent evidence. A canvas, screen wire or other such material shall securely cover all vehicles used for the collection/transportation of solid waste to prevent littering.
- (g) *Parking*. No parking of motor vehicles, except official county vehicles and the attendant's vehicle, shall be permitted at any time at any convenience center. Only temporary stopping for the purpose of authorized unloading of solid waste shall be permitted.
- (h) *Recycling*. The county may provide containers, at designated convenience centers, to facilitate recycling. Containers, when provided, are to facilitate collection of selected recycling commodities (such as plastics, glass, newspaper, used motor oil). Containers shall be clearly marked to indicate the recycling commodity or commodities that may be placed in the containers. It shall be illegal for any person to place anything in these containers other than the recycling commodity or commodities so designated.

(i) Scavenging.

- (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to scavenge in or around the containers or otherwise remove any discarded solid waste from or about any solid waste site or any bulk or roll-off container.
- (2) No person shall be permitted to remove trash, garbage, or any other items from within or around the containers or compactors located at the refuse sites except for those persons or companies authorized for such removal by the board of supervisors.
- (3) It shall be unlawful for any person, except for county personnel and authorized agents of the county, no person shall physically enter a county solid waste container or receptacle, or remove from a county solid waste container or receptacle any item in a county solid waste container or receptacle.

- (4) It shall be unlawful for any person, except for county personnel and authorized agents of the county, to sort through or examine the contents of any collection container or solid waste site for the purpose of removing items therefrom.
- (5) It shall be unlawful for any person except for county personnel and authorized agents of the county to loiter on or about any solid waste facility owned and operated by Russell County.

Sec. 17.2-110. Penalties.

Penalties. Violation of any provision of this article shall be deemed to be a Class 1 Misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$2,500.00, or no more than 12 months in jail, or both.

Sec. 17.2-111. Disposal of solid waste collected or generated in the county.

- (a) No person shall operate a private solid waste collection business within the county without first obtaining a permit from the County Administrator or his designee.
- (b) All solid waste generated or collected within the county shall be disposed of only at the facilities of the County designated for solid waste disposal.
- (c) Subsection (b) shall not apply to:
 - (1) Solid waste generated, purchased or utilized by an entity engaged in the business of manufacturing, mining, processing, refining or conversion except for an entity engaged in the production of energy or solid waste-derived fuels for sale to a person other than any entity controlling, controlled by or under the same control as the manufacturer, miner, processor, refiner or converter.
 - (2) Recyclable materials in volumes reported to the county administrator or his designee, which are those materials that have been source-separated by any person or materials separated from solid waste by any person for utilization in both cases as a raw material to be manufactured into a product other than fuel or energy.
 - (3) Construction solid waste to be disposed of at the transfer site.
 - (4) Waste oil.
- (d) It shall be unlawful for any person to dispose of solid waste generated or collected within the county at any place other than those designated pursuant to subsection (b). The county administrator or his designee following a hearing may revoke a permit to operate a private solid waste collection business obtained under subsection (a) for failure to comply with this section, and shall have the power to seek and obtain injunctive relief from a court of competent jurisdiction to prevent violations of this section, without a showing of irreparable harm. Operating a private solid waste collection business without a permit as required herein,

and any other violation of this sub-section, shall be punishable as a Class 3 Misdemeanor by a fine of \$500.00, with each day in violation constituting a separate offense.

§ 17.2-112. Effective date of ordinance.

This ordinance shall be effective on the 1st day of January, 2011. The County Administrator is directed to file a certified copy of this Ordinance in the Offices of the Clerk of the General District Court of Russell County and the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Russell County.

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE A REGIONAL INDUSTRIAL FACILITIES AUTHORITY PURSUANT TO SECTION 15.2-6400 ET SEQ. OF THE CODE OF VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, the Board recognizes that economic development of the County is dependent in large measure on the economic development of the Region as a whole;

WHEREAS, to promote and encourage economic activity, including but not limited to investment and employment of county residents, the Board desires to work in cooperation with neighboring Counties, Buchanan, Russell, and Dickenson, to facilitate the development of Industrial Facilities in the four County Region;

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Supervisors for Tazewell County, Virginia does hereby Ordain and establish a Regional Industrial Facilities Authority for Buchanan, Dickenson, Russell and Tazewell Counties pursuant to Section 15.2-6400 et seq. of the Code of Virginia and further resolves as follows:

- 1. The name of the Authority shall be the "Cumberland Industrial Facilities Authority", hereinafter "the Authority".
- 2. The member localities shall be Buchanan, Tazewell, Russell and Dickenson. Each locality's participation shall become effective as of the date their respective governing body enacts an ordinance substantially similar to this ordinance authorizing creation of the Authority.
- 3. The Authority shall be governed by an initial Board of Six (6) members. Three (3) members shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors for Buchanan County and Three (3) members shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors for Tazewell County.

In the event a third County shall enact an ordinance to join the Authority the number of members of the Board shall remain at Six (6), the most recently joining County's governing body shall be allowed to appoint Two (2) members of the Board to replace the longest serving member from each of the two initial member counties, such that each of the three member Counties' governing body shall have appointed two members of the Board.

In the event a fourth County shall enact an ordinance to join the Authority the number of members of the Board shall be increased to Eight (8) and the governing body of the fourth locality joining the Board may appoint two new members to the Board.

Each member of the Board shall be a resident of the locality whose governing body appointed the member. The Board members shall serve terms of four years, except that one of the first two members appointed by the governing body of each locality shall be appointed to a term of just two years, such that the terms of the members of the Board from each locality are staggered.

The Board shall have such authority and exercise such powers as are permitted by the Code of Virginia.

- 4. The Chairmanship of the Board shall be rotated annually among the member localities, such that no chairperson may serve as chairperson for more than one year consecutively and no two members appointed by the same locality may serve consecutive terms as chairperson.
- 5. No member may serve more than two consecutive terms, except that initial members who may be appointed to an initial two year term may serve two additional four year terms.
- 6. The Authority may adopt such rules and by-laws as are consistent with the Code of Virginia and this ordinance and may exercise all powers granted to such authorities under Virginia Law.

AN ORDINANCE TO CREATE A JOINT INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY PURSUANT TO SECTION 15.2-4916 OF THE CODE OF VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, the Board recognizes that economic development of the County is dependent in large measure on the economic development of the region as a whole;

WHEREAS, to promote and encourage economic activity, including but not limited to investment and employment of county residents, the Board desires to work in cooperation with neighboring Counties, Buchanan, Russell, and Dickenson, to facilitate industrial development in the four county region;

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Supervisors for Tazewell County, Virginia does hereby ordain and establish a Joint Economic Development Authority for Buchanan, Dickenson, Russell, and Tazewell Counties pursuant to Section 15.2-4916 et seq. of the Code of Virginia and further resolves as follows:

- 1. The name of the Authority shall be the "Joint Cumberland Economic Development Authority", hereinafter "the Authority" or "JCEDA".
- 2. The Authority shall include the localities of Buchanan, Tazewell, Russell and Dickenson. Each locality's participation shall become effective as of the date their respective governing body enacts an ordinance substantially similar to this ordinance authorizing creation of the Authority.
- 3. The Authority shall be governed by a Board of Eight (8) members. Two (2) members shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors for Buchanan County, Two (2) members shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors for Tazewell County, Two (2) members shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors for Russell County and Two (2) members shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors for Dickenson County.

Each member of the Board shall be a resident of the locality whose governing body appointed the member. The Board members shall serve terms of four years, except that one of the first two members appointed by the governing body of Buchanan, Tazewell, and Russell Counties shall be appointed to a term of just two years, such that

the terms of the members of the Board from each of those localities are staggered.

The Board shall have such authority and exercise such powers as are permitted by the Code of Virginia fir Industrial Development Authorities pursuant to Section 15.2-4916 of the Code of Virginia.

- 4. The Chairmanship of the Board shall be rotated annually among the member localities, such that no chairperson may serve as chairperson for more than one year consecutively and no two members appointed by the same locality may serve consecutive terms as chairperson.

What are Volunteer Stations?

A volunteer station is a public agency, faith-based or measurable private non-profit organization, as well as health care organizations that accept the responsibility for assignment and supervision of RSVP volunteers. Each volunteer station must sign a Memorandum of Understanding detailing RSVP activities that are needed at that station. All of the stations are asked to provide as much training and supervision required to help make your time and volunteer experience fulfilling.

Outlined in the MOU's each station agrees to provide volunteers with specific and appropriate assignments on a regularly scheduled basis. RSVP volunteers may not replace paid employees. No one at a volunteer station should ask you to do anything that the staff is unwilling to do.

Station staff serve as volunteer supervisors. All materials needed, in order to complete your volunteer assignments effectively, will be provided by the volunteer station. The station supervisor will explain assignments and should be considered your first source of information at the station.

When applicable, stations will provide meals for volunteers that serve more than four hours at a time. If you know of a service organization serving Tazewell County that could be added, please share the contact information with your area Volunteer Coordinator.

Benefits of RSVP

As an enrolled RSVP volunteer you are covered by personal liability and excess (supplemental) accident/automobile liability insurance at NO cost to you. Benefits include up to \$25,000 in medical insurance and \$1,000,000 in personal liability insurance. This insurance covers you while you are working at a volunteer assignment as well as while you are driving to and from the volunteer station you serve.

Once a year, RSVP sponsors a recognition event as one of the many services provided for volunteers. You may receive a special service pin or certificate and even some small gifts as celebration of your contributions. Proposal for Expanding RSVP

The Retired and Senior Volunteer Program at Clinch Valley Community Action, Inc. is one of the three oldest RSVP programs in the United States. It has been a program at CVCA for over 45 years.

RSVP is a Federal service program administered through the Corporation for National and Community Service which also is responsible for AmeriCorp, VISTA, Foster Grandparent Program and the Senior Companion Program.

RSVP volunteers in Tazewell County serve in over 35 Volunteer Stations providing a variety of volunteer service activities that address identified community needs. Volunteer Stations include food banks, hospital auxiliaries, schools, service organizations, TRIAD, Special Needs In Disaster, Volunteer Income Tax Assistance, Veterans services, cultural heritage and preservation groups, chambers of commerce, towns and more. Over 100 of the current 264 serving RSVP volunteers serve in activities that help the frail elderly and disabled remain independent in their homes. These Independent Living services include transportation to vital medical appointments and for grocery shopping, meal preparation and delivery, small home repairs, yard work, bringing in mail and making appointments, etc. Capacity building is another strong volunteer activity in several of the Volunteer Stations. RSVP volunteers solicit and gather local donated items for thrift stores and food banks, provide planning and implementation skills for fundraising events, market services and provide grant-writing skills for new funding and maintaining funding levels.

RSVP staff and CVCA conduct community assessments, develop and implement stakeholder, volunteer and customer surveys, and participate on multiple coalitions and committees in order to stay abreast of changes in the scope of needs and to capture as much community resource information as possible.

The RSVP at CVCA has a program director which is shared with the Senior Companion Program; one part-time Volunteer Coordinator and one part-time RSVP Administrative Assistant. The RSVP office is located in the main office of CVCA in North Tazewell. CVCA has 51 years of experience addressing community needs and managing Federal, State, foundation and local funding for over 30 service programs. The RSVP program has consistently received positive monitoring results and is proactive in addressing any suggestions or programmatic changes.

Volunteers must be ages 55 or older to serve in the RSVP program. The sponsors (CVCA) of RSVP programs are responsible for oversight of all volunteer activities, complete information gathering and capturing for volunteer registration information, volunteer activities, volunteer communications, volunteer recognition, recruiting and volunteer station communications. Each active RSVP volunteer is covered under a mandated supplemental insurance policy that provided secondary insurance for injury, liability, and vehicle use (to and from volunteer activity). The policy is paid for by the RSVP funded sponsor.

The Corporation for National and Community Service recently released a Notice of Funding Opportunity for funding available to provide RSVP program service in communities that are not currently served by RSVP. Funded programs will be required to provide volunteer services in specific focus areas such as Disaster Services, Economic Opportunity, Education, Environmental Stewardship, Health Futures

(Nutrition, Independent Living, Childhood Obesity), Veterans and Military Families and Capacity Building. Volunteers can also serve in programs and organizations that address locally identified needs not listed in these focus areas. Sponsors will be required to match 10% funding in year one, 20% in year two, and 30% for each year after. Match funding can be cash or in-kind.

The RSVP program at CVCA would like to expand services into Buchanan County and Russell County as both counties border Tazewell County. The grant request will be for \$75,000 per year for an initial grant cycle of three years. The grant is due 4/4/17. Our RSCP staff members have strong skills in writing funding requests and grant renewals for the program and will work in tandem with both county administrations and community leaders to hopefully expand RSVP services.

The following is an example of a typical month of service for RSVP Volunteers in Tazewell County.

3,368 RSVP Volunteer Hours and 125 Volunteers serving in October 2016. This represents \$24,418 in minimum wage value and \$69,210 in the Virginia 2016 Volunteer Value Scale.

51 RSVP volunteers served 1,149 hours in Independent Living (in-home) services such as providing transportation, meals, light housekeeping, small home repairs, companionship, socialization, and safety checks; in assisting Veteran's and Veteran family member; in disaster preparedness; and in capacity building (in-kind solicitation and fundraising) for local non-profit service agencies.

POLICY NO: 4.0 Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) Service to Relatives


The RSVP Operations Handbook states in Chapter 8, Section 36, Sub-Section E, Service to Relatives:

Assignments involving service to relatives are not precluded for RSVP volunteers. Projects should exercise good judgment, taking into account local customs and practices and avoiding the appearance of favoritism.

The following specifics will serve as guidelines for accepting and recording RSVP volunteer service hours to relatives.

Volunteer service hours provided to relatives will be credited for Independent Living assistance when the relative/client is frail and elderly, disabled, or homebound and shut-in without easy access to transportation.

Hours will not be credited if the relative is a member of the volunteer's household or if the volunteer provides consistent financial support to the relative.

Russell County Organizations Partner to Receive Virginia Tourism Corporation Grant for Tourism Marketing

Governor Terry McAuliffe announced that Russell County Tourism received \$5,000 from the Virginia Tourism Corporation Marketing Leverage Program grant fund. In total VTC awarded more than \$772,000 for 62 tourism marketing projects across the state to help increase visitation and revenue for Virginia's localities through tourism.

The grants are designed to help local and regional tourism entities attract more visitors by leveraging local marketing dollars, and will ultimately impact at least 260 other statewide tourism entities. The local organizations match the state grant funds by a minimum of 2:1 in order to support marketing projects. This funding cycle, the local partners will match the VTC grant dollars with more than \$3.64 million, providing more than \$4.4 million in new marketing to increase visitation to Virginia.

Russell County Tourism partnered with the Town of Lebanon, Vincent's Vineyard, and the Russell County Fair Association to supply matching funds for the project, which will include the printing of brochures, professional photography and video, and other efforts to attract tourists to the area.

"This grant will give Russell County the tools to increase the county's presence in a regionally-focused marketing plan for far Southwest Virginia" says Russell County Tourism Director Kim Short. "We are very proud to be the first locality to incorporate the newly developed Southwest Virginia Branding into our logo and brochures, and we want to continue to create partnerships that strengthen both Russell County and its neighbors from a tourism and economic development aspect".

The VTC Marketing Leverage Program is designed to stimulate new tourism marketing through partnerships by leveraging limited marketing dollars, resulting in increased visitor spending. A minimum of three entities must partner financially to apply and may consist of Virginia towns, cities, counties, convention and visitors bureaus, chambers of commerce, other local or regional destination marketing organizations, private businesses, museums, attractions, cultural events, and other not-for-profit entities.

"Today, we take another critical step in supporting one of Virginia's largest private sector industries and the individual communities across the Commonwealth that foster it," **said Governor McAuliffe.** "These Marketing Leverage Program grants provide a vital opportunity for destinations and businesses across the Commonwealth, helping to create jobs, promote economic development, and increase visitor spending. I congratulate the more than 260 tourism partners across the Commonwealth that received funding for 62 projects – not only the highest

number of partners awarded in the program's history, but the highest dollar match by partners in a single funding cycle."

Research shows that every VTC dollar invested in grants resulted in \$16 of direct visitor spending. Marketing campaigns that received Marketing Leverage Grants increased visitation by 15%.

"The Marketing Leverage Program grants provide vital funding to our tourism businesses across the Commonwealth, helping to make Virginia an incredible place to visit, but also to live," **said Todd Haymore, Secretary of Commerce and Trade.** "Through the MLP grant program, Virginia Tourism has helped demonstrate the power of partnerships, as well as the economic power of tourism. I thank all of our tourism partners and members of the General Assembly for their support of this program."

Tourism is an instant revenue generator for Virginia. In 2015, tourism generated \$23 billion in revenue, supported nearly 223,100 jobs and provided \$1.6 billion in state and local taxes. Dollars invested in tourism are proven to provide a 7:1 return in tax revenue for Virginia, and the grant awards and matching funds provide a stimulus to localities seeking to increase tourism visitation and revenue.



Railroad permits have been submitted to CSX, awaiting approval. We have preliminary plans for the force main line from Dante to St. Paul to be submitted this week. PER amendment has been submitted to DEQ, awaiting approval.

3.Castlewood Sewer (Westview) - Redesign complete, contacted all property owners regarding needed easements. Stephen finalized easement preparation. Rural Development has indicated we need to be complete with construction by March 2017. Expect to advertise in January, RD has approved a 2 week advertisement period.

4. Cstlewood Sewer (Phase IB) - Meeting held with the Russell County Administrator and Board of Supervisors, VDH, RD and DEQ to discuss the current ordinance and enforcement policy. Outcome of that meeting appears that the Board of Supervisors will amend and strengthen their current connection ordinance. Board of Supervisors took action at their last board meeting on the sewer portion, water put on hold till next month. We still plan to target the areas in Couch's Bottom, Greystone and Memorial Drive in the next couple months for interest.

- 5. Lake Bonaventure to South Clinchfield Line Replacement No change from last month. Finalizing plans for preparation of materials list.
